


Mid-Year Budget Review Shows Positive Year-End

Recently the City Council was presented its annual mid-year fiscal review by Interim Finance Director Ton Kanarr. The report indicated that this fiscal year should end better than originally projected due to increase in sales from auto dealers and fuel sales in particular. The City's five new auto dealers have enjoyed the national trend of people buying new vehicles in large numbers. "With every new \$20,000 car sold, the City receives about \$225 as part of its share of the sales tax charged," said Kanarr.

Also contributing to the projected increase in revenue this year is a number of one-time occurrences. This includes a \$300,000 adjustment by the State Board of Equalization for previously misallocated sales tax by them. In addition, the building permit payment for the 53-unit Glendora Crossings was received this year. Finally, the lack of a municipal election as no challengers sought to contest the two incumbent City Council members saved the city about



Kanarr's presentation also gave an estimated five-year projection of General Fund revenues and expenditures. The Finance Director told the audience that while this is an estimate and things could change, the City would likely see a positive budget for the next several years if it maintained its goal of financial stewardship.

"The City Council has made a number of positive and sound financial decisions over the last few years which have kept us on solid ground as we

can see from the information," said Kanarr. He cautioned that just one or two undisciplined decisions however, could change the picture just as easily.

The Council also heard from staff about several policy issues it will have to face over the next several years. Some of those include funding of the mandated National Pollution Discharge Elimination System designed to keep pollution out of the storm drains. Staff estimates that the recently approved MS4 permit by the LA Regional Water Control Board could cost the City up to \$1 million annually.

Other issues included rising Workers Compensation costs, funding of infrastructure maintenance and still rising pension charges from CalPERS. The City Manager indicated that while not all these issues need addressing next year, they do within the next 2-3 years and will impact the fiscal situation greatly as a result of the Council's decisions.

Community Services Officer Julie Linger

Community Services Officer Julie Linger, responsible for Property and Evidence at the Glendora Police Department, was recently honored as the Greater Los Angeles Area's Property Officer of the Year for 2012 by the California Association of Property and Evidence.

When Julie attended an International Association of Property and Evidence conference last year, as an employee new to property and evidence, she soon realized that she was working with an archaic property and evidence tracking system that was over ten



years old, requiring such an intense amount of work on her part to properly process and track evidence that two people were previously doing the job that she was now doing by herself. While we have no doubt she can single-handedly work at the pace that two people previously did, it was decided as an organization that we would work smarter. Spurred by her interest in updating our evidence system after Julie observed what was available, as an organization we were able to nearly seamlessly transition to a much more efficient property and evidence system that allows her to spend significantly less time with incoming property. Julie now has more time to concentrate on purging items, and in fact, in just a little over two months the system has been online, Julie has purged 25% of our total evidence and property, and realistically, in the near future, should be able to reach a total of nearly 75% of the total property that can be removed from what we were previously storing. Julie trained nearly all of the officers in the organization in the use of the new tracking software, and the feedback for the new system has been excellent.

Spurred by the transition to new evidence software, monies were found to remodel our outdated evidence processing room utilized by patrol officers. This has been an excellent upgrade to the previous room which lacked the proper space to process evidence, often resulting in officers processing evidence on a counter in the main hallway of the police department.

Julie has also taken upon herself to attend patrol briefings for both night and day shift to teach officers the proper techniques of collecting DNA evidence. This has resulted in several suspect's being identified in the CODIS database which has led to their arrest and prosecution.

Julie also helps out filling in as a dispatcher in communications when needed, is an experienced field community services officer handling preliminary crime investigations, and is a fully accredited traffic accident reconstructionist, a very difficult and notable accomplishment. Julie is a graduate of California Polytechnic University at Pomona, holding a bachelor's degree in restaurant and hotel management.

Having an outstanding individual in property and evidence is critical to the mission of the police department to ensure that the integrity and accuracy of evidence processing and storage is never brought into question. It is a privilege to have Community Services Officer Julie Linger as a member of the Glendora City Family.

The collection and storage of evidence and seized property is one of the most important responsibilities of a police department according to Chief Rob Castro. We have seen over the years high profile criminal cases compromised by improper evidence handling. This has always been a priority at the Glendora Police Department and Chief Castro has been a member of the California and International Association of Property Officers to ensure the police department remains current on evidence and property laws, procedures and systems.

City Council Approves Avalon Glendora Project


At the February 26, 2013 meeting, the City Council unanimously approved a nationally known developer's application to build a 256 Mixed Use Unit at the corner of Route 66 and Glendora Avenue. AvalonBay Communities Inc., is one of the largest apartment builders and operators in the United States with some 4,000 complexes on both coasts.

The approved project, known as AvalonBay Glendora, will cover nearly 5 acres and have several amenities for its future tenants. The project will include a fitness center, several patio areas for tenants to relax and have barbeques, a pool, club room, basketball court, a children's lot and a dog park. Along with these amenities the project will have 4,000 square feet of commercial area where it is hoped that new neighborhood retailers and services will locate.

The project is the first Mixed-Use project within the Town Center Mixed-Use (TCMU) specific plan area, which was approved in 2004 by the City in anticipation of the Gold Line light rail station. The future station will be located just a few hundred feet away from the project. "With the Gold Line coming and the State regulations encouraging cities to develop transit oriented developments, the city has tried to be in front of providing an opportunity for quality investors to come to Glendora," said Planning Director Jeff Kugel.

According to AvalonBay representatives, rents for the 1 bedroom to 3 bedroom units will likely price out between \$1,800 to \$2,100 per month. Tenants will have an enclosed parking structure with nearly 500 spaces and storage areas for bulky items such as bikes. The Developer is hoping to break ground on the project in Fall 2013. Much of that time line will depend on the California Department of Finance, which must approve the sale of a former Glendora Redevelopment Agency owned parcel to AvalonBay.

As part of the conditions of approval, the developer will improve sections of Glendora Avenue and Route 66 to handle the additional traf-




fic that naturally come with any development of this scope. Also, included will be upgrades to water and sewer lines in the immediate area that will necessitate the repaving of a significant portion of the streets abutting the project.

At the City Council meeting, the Developer submitted written letters of support from several business and shopping centers in the immediate vicinity. The Albertson Store was especially energetic about the possibility of so many new customers for its store.

Glendora Police Department using DNA technologies to improve public safety

The collection of DNA evidence by police to assist in identifying crime suspects is one of the most prolific advances in the history of law enforcement. The Glendora Police Department has been very successful in the past year identifying crime suspects with DNA; in fact, more so than with fingerprints. Returns from the crime lab have been outstanding. Glendora police have received positive identification results on as many as 40% of DNA crime lab submissions,



resulting in 28 positive identifications of suspect(s) in 2012. Most suspects have been located, interviewed and arrested. Several were already in county jail or state prison on other matters, indicating how active they were in committing crimes. All Glendora officers and field support personnel have been trained and equipped with DNA collection kits.

For instance, a Glendora business was victim to a window-smash burglary in which over \$11,000 in equipment was stolen. An officer located blood drops leading away from the crime scene and swabbed the blood for DNA. A few months later the results returned to a suspect who had served time in prison in Northern CA for burglarizing similar businesses a month after he victimized the Glendora business. He had been released from prison on early-release probation (AB 109 Public Safety Realignment) and was residing in Indio. Glendora detectives located the suspect in Indio and arrested him based on the DNA evidence. The suspect was shocked that Glendora Police were able to identify and apprehend him as he commented he came to Glendora because he thought it was far from his residence in Indio affording him an easy getaway.

In another example, a Glendora Restaurant was burglarized and the suspect left behind a screwdriver. DNA was collected from the screwdriver that matched to a person who also had a DNA hit for a burglary that occurred in Covina. Covina and Glendora detectives interviewed the suspect, and two felony counts of commercial burglary were filed.

In yet another example, a suspect entered the victim's garage and used a power tool inside the garage to force entry into the residence. An officer swabbed the power tool for DNA, resulting in a hit to a suspect with an extensive criminal history all over Southern California. Glendora detectives are searching for the suspect and expect to make an arrest in the near future.

Chief Castro has led the Glendora Police Department to implement several new cutting edge technologies to improve officers efficiency and public safety. In the future, Chief Castro anticipates that high-tech DNA analyzers will likely be available to patrol officers who will be able to collect a sample from the crime scene and have the DNA swab analyzed prior to clearing the scene, potentially knowing who a suspect is before leaving the crime scene—just like they do on TV!

Developer Requests City to Change General Plan

The City's Planning Commission will be hearing a request by Olson Development, a nationally known residential developer to build 23 two-story detached condos on property currently zoned for medical use on Bonnie Cove and Gladstone. The application is requesting the City to change the current General Plan designation, zoning, and to permit certain modifications to the multi-family standards in order for the development to occur.

The application covers four parcels totaling about 5.72 acres of which the developer would only build on one of the four parcels or about 2.47 acres. The remaining uses on the properties, a medical rehabilitation center and two single-family homes would remain as non-conforming uses on the requested rezoned property.

The application originally filed in late 2011 has been under study by City Hall for nearly 12 months and will be presented to the Planning Commission at their March 19 meeting for consideration. The Planning Department staff has recommended that the application not be granted for a variety of reasons cited in the report. "Olson is a very reputable company yet the proposed development in our opinion would not be consistent with the existing neighborhood which is single-family" said Planning Director Jeff Kugel.

The area in question was annexed into the City of Glendora in the late 1960's. At that time the corner at Bonnie Cove and Gladstone was zoned for medical use and the rest of the area around it was single-family. City officials indicated that when an area is annexed into a city, the closest city zoning to the county zoning is typically applied so that property owners won't be negatively impacted. That appears to be the case here where two of the four parcels in question retained a medical use designation.

Planning staff cited in the report that the application appeared to be flawed as three of the four parcels would not be developed in the near future and thus no guarantee that they would ever transition in an orderly and compatible project to the proposed 23-multi story units. The report also raised question about the "ripple" effect on other properties in the area and whether future property owners would request similar rezoning.

Kugel said the law is clear that a city cannot give disparate treatment among similar situated property owners. Under this application, two existing single-family properties would be up-zoned to allow for higher density development. Staff noted that there are four other properties on Bonnie Cove that abut the proposed project that could seek similar treatment if the application is approved. "Ultimately, the burden would likely shift to the City to show we have sound reasons of why the properties were not really similar if we were to deny applications in the future" Kugel added.

City Planner Michael Forbes, who prepared the report on the application, indicated that changing or modifying a city's General Plan should be done very carefully and with very intense deliberation. State law requires every city and county to have a General Plan. The League of California Cities' Planning Commissioner's Handbook describes a general plan as the foundation for local land use planning by providing a vision for a 10-20 year time period. The vision guides the physical development of the community through ordinances and policies that elected and appointed officials will develop during that period of time.

State law recognizes that such Plans are a "living" document and can be modified but limits the times a city can change its General Plan during any year. The Handbook cautions decision makers that requests for amending a General Plan should be balanced against the community's vision and benefits that any specific project may generate for the community.

The developer pointed out that the property has been the subject of previous contention when the current property owners sought to expand their operations twice in the last decade. Neighborhood opposition concern the compatibility of a then proposed multistory assisted living complex. The projects which met the current zoning standards and were approved by the City have never materialized for a variety of reasons. Several residents from the neighborhood have championed the proposed changes as a better alternative than having an assisted-living facility built.

In the event the Commission feels inclined to amend the General Plan and zoning requirements, the Planning Staff has suggested that, as an alternative to the recommended denial, a single-family zoning designation would be better and more compatible for the existing neighborhood. Forbes indicated that such a designation would eliminate concerns about other property seeking changes in the future to gain benefit of increased property values by up-zoning to allow more development.

The Planning Commission will ultimately make a recommendation to the Glendora City Council on any changes being requested. As of the time of writing this article, the Planning Commission had not taken formal action on the application. Wrem - Meacham and Dalton Canyon Trails

Train Horns

City officials have received numerous calls about why the daily freight train is crawling through intersections activating the train horn for long periods of time. The Glendora Police Department reported that the complaint calls have tripled over the last few months and those drivers are increasingly ignoring crossing warning arms as a result of the slow moving trains.

According to Metrolink which has oversight of the track operations, the Burlington Northern & Santa Fe Railway Company (BNSF) is the only operating service on our tracks at this time. However, the future Gold Line Light Rail will eventually place tracks alongside the freight tracks as it makes its way out to Montclair. BNSF currently serves the Miller Brewing Company in Irwindale along the 210 Freeway. As the brewing company is the only company serviced, use of the track is very light and erratic. The train usually comes through at least once a day and sometimes twice. However, the time of day can vary greatly due to no set schedule.

Glendora Police report that according to Metrolink officials, a significant increase in vandalism due to individuals stealing copper wire used to activate the crossing arms is the primary cause that has lead train operators to take required additional steps to ensure public safety. Over the last year, the crossing mechanisms between Barranca and Loraine have been vandalized 15 times. This has caused either the arms to activate on their own or not operate at all when the trains approach intersections.

"This is a very serious situation and we are working with the Sheriff's Department, which is contracted by Metrolink to patrol the tracks and has jurisdiction for investigating all crimes along the tracks and creating preventive measures," said Chief Rob Castro of the Glendora Police Department. "These trains cannot stop quickly and thus if a crossing is not working, the drivers and pedestrians are no match for a multi-ton freight train."

In fact, Glendora Police have been the only police department in the area successful in apprehending individuals attempting to steal copper wire from crossing mechanisms. Police say the price of copper has seen a sharp rise so thieves are targeting this commodity for quick sales. Not only has Metrolink been victim but the Glendora Community Services Department has seen its Pompei Park vandalized when thieves stole the wiring for the ball field lights recently.

Chief Castro indicated that it is not just the tens of thousands of dollars it takes to repair items like ball field lights or the train crossing arms, it's the danger these criminals are creating for the motoring public. "We see people getting frustrated and attempting to drive around the down arms because of the malfunctioning or the extra precautions the trains must take. We fear that a tragic situation is going to occur if motorists disobey the warning arms and lights."

BNSF officials indicate that due to the number of problems with the crossing arms, federal regulations require them to take measures like sounding the horn as they approach and until they clear an intersection crossing and require one of the operators to walk in front of the idling train to ensure traffic is stopped. The freight train is required to follow the safety regulations of the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA). The additional safety procedures must be conducted at all times of the day and night. The website for FRA highlights the difficulty these trains have in stopping by showing a train traveling 55 mph needing over a mile to come to a complete stop.

Police remind drivers that the law requires them to stop and wait when the crossing arms are down no matter what is occurring. The consequences could be a ticket or something much worse if you are hit by a train.

Glendora Police conduct regular patrols near the railroad tracks. To report suspicious activity on the tracks, Glendora Police urge residents and businesses to call the Glendora Police Department at 626-914-8297.


